Love one another

Few Christians would deny that loving one another is a key facet of Christian living. Sometimes we forget two aspects to it – that the call to love is not restricted to those who are close to us or who are “our kind of people” and secondly, that the ability to deliver love ultimately stems from the love that God has shown to us. While we are not to be doormats we should recognise that we have an obligation to be generous and open in sharing the full and undeserved love that God gives to us in Christ. We certainly shouldn't take a view that others have to “earn” the right to our love or care. “Freely, freely you have received – freely, freely give”.



or the Church's) love and care stop and remind yourself that we have nothing to commend ourselves to God apart from Jesus' love. We are accepted solely on his goodness and grace – not on our own merits – and we must learn to accept others on the same basis.

We need everyone to “get on board” with our attempts to welcome and reach out to those who up until now may have had little or no contact with the Church nothing of a faith background. It is a privilege to be able to reach out, freely, with the love of God – but it has to be backed by every one of us. It only needs one of us to unwittingly question someone's “right” or “deserving” for the whole outreach effort of the congregation to be undermined. A few years ago some Christian youngsters wore wristbands with the letters WWJD – What Would Jesus Do? With or without a band could we not all apply that sentiment to our dealings, particularly with enquirers and those new to the Church (but really with everyone) and try to avoid “putting our foot in it” and unpicking the open welcome that Jesus has given all of us and which he wants us to extend to others.

Perhaps it is simply human nature but Christians are not immune from the tendency to want to limit our generosity, our love, our care to those who deserve it. Natural, perhaps, but it doesn't square with the nature of God's love to us – which comes freely, and without our deserving – it is grounded in the grace of God in Christ Jesus. And that needs to be source of our love and care – indeed of all our attitudes towards others.

Next time you find yourself tempted to question someone else's right to your (or God's

World Day of Prayer

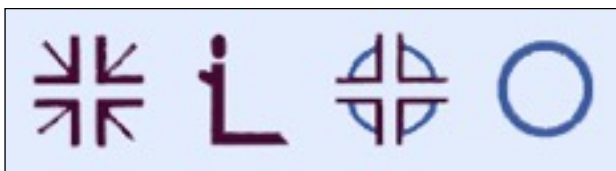
Motto – “Informed Prayer and Prayerful Action”



The World Day of Prayer 2015 will take place on Friday 6th March. The service is entitled “**Do you know what I have done to you?**” based on the Gospel of John 13:1-17 and has been prepared by the Christian women of the Bahamas.

The World Day of Prayer (WDP) was started in 1887 in the United States of America by a Mrs Mary Ellen Darwin James, President of the Woman's Board of Home Missions in the Presbyterian Church of America. Today, WDP is an international, ecumenical, prayer movement initiated and carried out by Christian women in more than 180 countries and over 1000 languages. Every year Christians of many traditions and all ages, celebrate a common day of prayer on the first Friday in March.

Through the WDP, women are encouraged to become aware of other countries and cultures and no longer live in isolation. They are also encouraged to take up the burdens of other people, to sympathize with the problems of other countries and cultures and pray with and for them. Women are also encouraged to become aware of their talents and use them in the service of society. The WDP aims to demonstrate that prayer and action are inseparable and that both have immeasurable influence in the world



The symbol for WDP (shown at the top of this article) was developed by the women of Ireland and adopted as the international logo in 1982. It's design is made up of arrows converging from the four points of the compass, persons kneeling in prayer, the Celtic Cross and the circle, as representing

the world and our unity through all our diversity.

Every year Worship services focus on a different country and a specific theme. This coming year (March 2015) the focus is The Bahamas. A country made up of many scattered islands known as “The Family of Islands” covering 100,000 square miles of the Atlantic Ocean.

The WDP national/regional committees of the Bahamas have prepared The Order of Worship of the theme “Do you know what I have done to you” and this will be used in services all over the world, making that country the focus of prayer and understanding.

I hope that this has given you a little bit of an insight into the WDP. Preparations for 6 March 2015 begin here in Montrose in November with the ordering and distribution of materials to the various groups in the town and Bible Study Sessions take place in February.
