### Patterns of Church Life

Many organisations plan their work on a sessional year with a good break in the summer – schools being among the more obvious. Sometimes churches partially adopt that model though, of course, there is worship all year round and there are often different activities in the summer when some of the regular events are on hold – in our case Summer Mission and the Summer Openings loom large so it is far from being a summer shut-down. There is biblical warrant for periods of rest and refreshment and we ought to take proper account for the well-being of our fellow church members, especially those who are apt to be overworked. Even volunteers need a good work/life balance and times when the pressures are less and there is more time to spend with family or friends and to take stock of things – even in a spiritual way.

I have been more conscious this year that the months



come round quickly and that even Church life is busy, sometimes pressured for folks. As well as the regular events we have extras and special events pretty well at least on a monthly basis. Among upcoming events we have the Local Church Review, Pudding Night, Chaplains at the Music Festival, Queen's Birthday Lunch, Summer Mission, Summer Opening, an event at the end of August to highlight all the work of the Church and that is before "next session"! It is good to get a break from some of the routine but let's not imagine that things are going to close down over the summer. God doesn't go on holiday (though if we are away he will be there!) and we can continue to worship

throughout the summer and know his presence in whatever we are up to. Please make use of what might be a different and more relaxed pace over the summer (well after Summer Mission) to recharge your batteries and to be refreshed in body, mind and spirit. But perhaps also consider whether there are areas where you might be able to help out with – say with some of the "one off" events that are coming up if not in the ongoing regular activities. Everybody can't be at everything but if we are to offer as wide a range of opportunities we could really do with broadening the base of support where that is possible.

And perhaps we could drive things forward a bit after the Local Church Review and all take time to ask ourselves where we might develop as a congregation and what our individual part in the whole scheme of things might be?

saw the final phase of the Chrisimon Tree and nobody was disappointed.

We watched and waited for the story of the Chrisimon Tree to unfold – first the Christmas Tree was decorated by members of the congregation – all in white and gold

with Christian symbols which represented majesty and purity. After Christmas, the decorations were stored away, the tree was stripped of its branches and made into a crude cross that was displayed in the church during Lent. This emphasised that Christ died on a crude and simple cross.


Easter Morning arrived and the Cross had been moved to the front of the Chancel. The flower committee made an excellent job of decorating the church for Easter and there was an air of expectation in the church with the Town Band adding to the atmosphere. A simple flower arrangement had been placed at the centre of the cross and there were pots of spring flowers placed round the base. During the service those present in the congregation were invited to come forward and decorate the cross with daffodils, this proved to be very moving and the tree once more came alive in front of our eyes. It was no longer dead and we experienced a tinge of how the Disciples must have felt that first Easter day – Jesus was alive, he had risen from the dead!

The daffodils were carefully removed following the service and distributed to some of our members who were not able to be with us but are very much in our thoughts.
